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R. P. SETHU PILLAI

R. P. Sethu Pillai (1896–1961), a luminary in Tamil scholarship, transitioned from law to become a revered professor at the University of Madras.

Born in Rajavallipuram, Tirunelveli District, his passion for Tamil ignited after hearing Maraimalai Adigal's speech in 1912. Following a stint in politics, he dedicated himself to teaching, with notable roles at Annamalai University and later as the Head of the Tamil department at Madras University, Chennai.


Renowned as "Sollin Selvar" for his Tamil proficiency, Sethu Pillai authored over twenty-five books, including a biography of Bishop Robert Caldwell. He received the first Sahitya Akademi Award for Tamil in 1955.

As a board member of the Tamil advisory board for Sahitya Akademi, he played a pivotal role in creating the Tamil encyclopedia and concluding the Tamil lexicon.

In 2009, the Government of Tamil Nadu nationalized Sethu Pillai's works, solidifying his legacy in Tamil literature.

Nara Nachiappan, born in 1927 in the scenic town of Athangudi in Ramanathapuram district, was a literary luminary and cultural stalwart. In 1945, he founded the influential autograph magazine "Aingaran," showcasing his early foray into the literary realm.

Notably, Nachiappan played a pivotal role as the General Secretary of the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam in Burma, contributing significantly to the socio-political landscape. His literary prowess extended to songwriting for renowned plays such as Ramasamy's "Manamagal" and Anna's "Chandhiramogan", leaving an indelible mark on Tamil cultural expressions. In the literary arena, he was introduced as an esteemed poet under the title Bharathidasan in the widely-read Ponni magazine of that era. Beyond his editorial ventures, Nachiappan further enriched Tamil literature with his magazine "Ilandamizhan" in 1972.

Nachiappan's literary contributions encompass two volumes of impactful songs, including a collection of children's songs, reflecting his versatile talent. His works resonate with themes of atheism, a profound love for Tamil, social consciousness, and rationality, making Nara Nachiappan a distinguished figure in the cultural and literary landscape.

Madhavan was born in 1934 in Trivandrum (Thiruvananthapuram), Kerala, to Chellammal and Avudainayagam, who belonged to Kanyakumari district. His schooling in the Malayalam medium gave him an opportunity to taste Malayalam literature.


His literary interest widened with the Tamil works of stalwarts such as Pudhumaipithan, Ka.Naa.Su., La.Sa.Raa., T. Janakiraman, Na. Pichamurthy, Ki. Rajanarayanan and Sundara Ramasamy. While Madhavan was engaged in business in Trivandrum's Chaalai market area, Tamil mixed with Malayalam spoken by the common people became the inspiration for his characters.

Over a period of about sixty years, he has created a large body of literary work: three novels Punalum Manalum (On a River's Bank), Krishna Parunthu (Brahmini Kite), Thoovaanam (Drizzle); three important translations from Malayalam: Malayatoor Ramakrishnan's Yakshi (A Mythical Being), P. K. Balakrishnan's Ini Gnan Urangatte (And Now, Let Me sleep) and Karoor Nilakantapillai's Sammaanam (Reward); two novellas Kaalai (Bull), Ettavathu Naal (Eighth Day); some literary essays and more than sixty stories.

You can call him as an Oru Kadaitheruvin Kalaignan (An artiste of a trader street). A few can match his naturalist writing with photographic details while narrating the evil side of humans.
